Reconnected Croydon Levelling Up Fund Programme

Programme Overview

The £24.1m Reconnected Croydon Programme will use a range of funding, including £18.5m in Levelling Up Fund, circa £1m in TFL LIP and Growth Zone funding.

Projects will provide:

- Improved connections and public realm throughout Croydon town centre, East and West Croydon stations, along London Road, North End and Wellesley Road, as well as in the Old Town area and from the town centre to South End.
- A new civic space contributing to the Fair Field cultural complex.

Contributes, alongside other projects, to the Council's vision to 'Reconnect, Refresh, Revitalise and Regenerate' the town centre.

£18.5m of LUF contingent on delivering benefits. Any reduction will be subject to change control and potential reduction in funding.

Will be undertaking ongoing monitoring and evaluation.

Connecting Kenley GLA – Good Growth Fund

What is Connecting Kenley?

- The Connecting Kenley Programme is a series of projects intended to improve pedestrian road safety, transport, air quality, support spaces, community spaces and the appearance of streets in Kenley.
- Projects have been designed in line with residents' priorities from the Kenley Community Plan.
- The Connecting Kenley Programme is funded by Croydon Council and the Mayor of London's Good Growth Fund, with supporting partners.



Background

In 2018, Kenley had seen an increase in house building.
 This put pressure on the local area.

 To address these issues, Croydon Council secured funding from the Mayor of London's Good Growth Fund to develop a community plan in partnership with the community. Croydon Council engaged with residents and businesses across Kenley.



Background

 In 2020, the draft Kenley Community Plan was issued. At the same time, Croydon Council secured funding to deliver the priorities identified in the Kenley Community Plan. The plan included description of engagement events and the community's thoughts.

• In 2021, the Kenley Community Advisory Group (KCAG) was established by Croydon Council, to guide delivery of the Kenley Community Plan.



Kenley Community Advisory Group

 KCAG members include local Ward Members, local residents from residents' associations, community organisations, faith groups and Friends groups, to represent the Kenley community.



Background

 In 2022, Croydon Council and Kenley Community Advisory Group worked together to develop projects for Kenley.

• In 2023, Croydon Council secured additional GLA Air Quality Funding to deliver landscaping and update the street appearance to Old Lodge Lane Parade. This makes the total funding, from the Mayor of London, £903,776.

7 projects were formed from the Kenley Community Plan and the resident engagement workshops. These are:

1. Community Hubs

Works completed at **Kenley Memorial Hall**:

- New reinforced gravel car park and bicycle stands
- Repair works to external steps and handrail
- New external signage and lighting
- New accessible and unisex toilets, with baby change
- New electric range cooker and fire door to the kitchen
- New fixed projector in the large hall











1. Community Hubs

Works completed at **Old Lodge Lane Baptist Church**:

- New community room, available to hire
- New room for the Purley Food Stop Shop
- New accessible toilet
- New ramp
- New landscaping, spill out space, canopy and external lighting
- New signage
- New glass frontage












2. Wayfinding

Croydon Council are in the process of delivering wayfinding signage across Kenley, to promote local walks, highlight iconic locations and create connections between the north and south of Kenley. This includes:

- Fingerpost signage across Kenley
- Breadcrumb signage and tree disks through woodland paths
- Station signage including a Kenley Map














- Croydon Council have commissioned a mural at Old Lodge Lane Baptist Church Community Hub.
- The mural artist held a codesign workshop at Old Lodge Lane Baptist Church where local visitors expressed their values and themes that represent their community. The artist then used these ideas within the mural.

3. Pocket Park

Croydon Council are in the process of delivering a pocket park on the Old Lodge Lane Parade. This includes:

- New rubber wetpour floor surface
- New planting
- New seating
- A bug hotel
- A bird box
- Play-on-the-way equipment like stepping logs













4. Healthy Streets


- This is a series of proposals to improve pedestrian road safety in Kenley.
- 3 key areas have been identified:
 - Kenley Lane
 - Hayes Lane Aerodrome
 - Hayes Lane South
- KCAG will be hosting an open workshop in July to discuss proposals

Kenley Lane	Drivers use this as a through road, but it is closed at one end.	 Introduce a NO THROUGH RD sign to prevent drivers from entering Kenley Lane which is closed at its end.
(Hayes Lane) Aerodrome	Drivers travel at high speeds, affecting pedestrian safety as people enter Kenley Aerodrome.	 Speed reducing measures, including: reducing current posted speed limit of 40mph to 30mph buildout to improve pedestrian safety at opposite entrance to Kenley Aerodrome adjustment of parking bays
Hayes Lane South	A section of Hayes Lane is very narrow with no pedestrian footways, sharp bends and poor visibility, which is a concern for pedestrian safety as this is a road used by pedestrians frequently to access the station and other amenities.	 Any proposals will need input from wider engagement, as other roads feed into Hayes Lane.



5. Electric Vehicle Charging Points

 We are in the process of delivering a series of electric vehicle charging points across Kenley.





6. Secure Cycle Hub

- Croydon Council approached Govia Thameslink Railway to discuss delivery of a bike hub.
- In 2023, a secure bike hub was opened at Kenley Train Station.
- The hub is designed with space for 16 bicycles and space for up to 4 cargo or adapted bicycles. Bikes are protected by the fob entry system and CCTV. The hub also has a repair stand and a pump for tyres.
- Security fobs can be collected at the Station Ticket Office.





7. Flood Alleviation

- In 2023, Phase 1 works began (construction of a water storage area). Planting (shrubs and trees) and seating was also been installed. All Saints & St Barnabas Churches have adopted the planting.
- In 2024, Phase 2 of the works has now been completed. This included installing additional pipework to convey the water to the storage area. Croydon Council are now monitoring the completed works.





South Norwood Heritage Action Zone – Historic England and GLA Good Growth Funded

Background

- The South Norwood regeneration programme has been underway since April 2019.
- It was originally a £2.3m programme delivering four workstreams: community hubs; workspaces and shops; placemaking; and business support and community capacity building.
- The GLA and Croydon Council were match-funding the programme, each contributing £1.16m.
- From April 2020, a further £1.1m from Historic England's High Streets Heritage Action Zone (HSHAZ) increased the budget to £3.3m.
- Adding a new heritage community engagement workstream and expanding the scope of the workspaces and shops workstream to incorporate the upper fascades of heritage high street properties.







Portland Road Bridge

Portland Road bridge is another important gateway in South Norwood to the lively shopping parades on Portland Road and, for those travelling north, framing a striking view of Stanley Arts beyond the junction with High Street.

The project to install feature lighting to the footway which was paused in 2020 due to lockdown is underway once again.

In addition to replacing the existing lighting with LED lighting above the footway on either side of the bridge, the project also includes repairs to the Roots, Routes, Roots mosaic. We are working with Network Rail to agree an alternative location for the mosaic on Clifford Road where it will not suffer the same water damage it's currently subject to under the bridge.




UK Shared Prosperity Fund

- The UKPSF is part of the former government's levelling up agenda and will provide £2.6 billion funding of new funding for local investment by March 2025.
- The aim of the funding is to improve pride in place and increase life chances across the UK.
- The government identified three UKSPF investment priorities: communities and places, supporting local businesses and people and skills.



UK Shared Prosperity Fund

- The 16 Place Policies of Croydon provide frameworks to guide development management and support the creation of sustainable neighbourhoods.
- UKSPF areas of focus are Thornton Heath, New Addington, Purley, Selsdon and West Croydon & London Road.
